

Hard words


This book has some hard words.

This book is by the ACT Electoral Commission.



The people are called members.


The members make the laws for Canberra.

public transport.












Also the laws are about

Who chooses the members?



People who are on the ACT **electoral roll** vote for the members in the election.

How to enrol

What is the electoral roll?

The electoral roll is the list of people who can vote at

an election.

Who can be on the ACT electoral roll? You must

- be an Australian citizen and
- IDENTITY CARD
- be 18 years old or older

and

■ live in the ACT.

You must put your name on the electoral roll.

You can ask for help.

How do I get on the electoral roll?



Get an enrolment form

- from the post office
- from Elections ACT
- at <u>www.aec.gov.au</u> click on Enrol to vote.



Fill in the form.

You can ask for help.



Post the paper form to us.


We put your name on the electoral roll.

Now you can vote in the election.

What else do I have to tell you?

You must tell us when you

- change your address
- or



• change your name.

What does vote mean?

You vote on election day.

Your vote shows your choice.

What is my vote for?



Your vote helps choose the members for the Assembly.

The electorates

The ACT is divided into areas called **electorates**.



The people in each electorate choose 5 members for the Assembly.

There are 5 electorates in the ACT.

The electorate names are

- Brindabella
- Ginninderra
- Kurrajong
- Murrumbidgee
- Yerrabi

You can find your electorate on a map.

The map is on page 33 of this book.

You can ask for help to read the map.



Why should I vote?

Your vote is your right.



Your vote gives you power.

You help choose who makes the laws.

No one can say who you must vote for.

Your vote is your say.


Do I have to vote?



Where can I vote?

You vote at a **polling place**.

We will make a list of polling places.



Look in The Canberra Times on the day before the election.



When can I vote?



Polling places open at 8 am on election day.



Polling places close at 6 pm on election day.

What do I do at the polling place?

You join the line of people.

You go to the table with the **election official**.

Say your name and address.




The election official marks your name off the electoral roll.

The election official gives you a **ballot paper**.

What is a ballot paper?

A ballot paper is a list of candidate names.





Each candidate wants to be elected to be a member of

the Assembly.

You choose the candidates you think are best for the job.

You help choose 5 members.

What do I do with the ballot paper?



Take your ballot paper to the voting screen.

There is a pencil in the voting screen.

Also you can ask an election official for help.


What if I make a mistake?

Ask for a new ballot paper.




I cannot vote on election day. What can I do?

You can vote before election day.

You can

vote at a pre-poll voting centre

or



vote by post.

Vote at a pre-poll voting centre

Pre-poll voting centres are open 3 weeks before the election.

Vote by post

You can get a postal vote application from

- Elections ACT
- <u>www.elections.act.gov.au</u>
- the post office in Canberra or Queanbeyan.



Fill out the form.

You can get help.



When we get your form we will send you a postal vote.



Fill out your vote and post it to us.

You have finished your vote.

Words in this book (glossary)

Australian citizen – a person born in Australia.

or

a person born overseas who lives in Australia.

This person has made a special promise to follow all the laws of Australia.

This person has become an Australian citizen.



Ballot box – a box in the polling place where you put your filled-in ballot paper.

Election day – the day you go to vote.



Election official – a person who works at elections.

Pre-poll voting centre – the place where you can

vote before election day.

Polling place – the place where you vote on election day.



Postal Vote – We post you a ballot paper.

You write your vote on the ballot paper.



You post your vote back to us before election day.


