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Suggestions and Comments

Members of the public, political parties and other organisations are invited to make suggestions to the Redistribution Committee for the Australian Capital Territory on proposed electoral boundaries for ACT Legislative Assembly elections. The suggestions will be made public and comments on these suggestions are also invited.

Making Submissions

The Redistribution Committee will formally invite suggestions and comments on 10 February 2011. **Written suggestions** relating to the redistribution of the ACT Legislative Assembly electorates must be lodged with the Redistribution Committee on or before **10 March 2011**.

Copies of all suggestions received by the Committee will be available for public inspection at the office of the ACT Electoral Commission or from the Commission's website at **www.elections.act.gov.au** from **11 March 2011**.

Written comments relating to any suggestions must be lodged by **24 March 2011**.

General Information

Why is a Redistribution Taking Place?

The *Electoral Act 1992* provides that a redistribution of electorates for the ACT Legislative Assembly must begin as soon as practicable after the beginning of the period 2 years before the date of the next election. The next ACT Legislative Assembly election is due to be held on 20 October 2012.

Who is on the Redistribution Committee?

The Redistribution Committee consists of the ACT Electoral Commissioner (Mr Phillip Green), the ACT Planning Authority (Mr Neil Savery), the ACT Surveyor-General (Mr Bill Hirst) and the Regional Director, ACT Office, Australian Bureau of Statistics (Mr Stephen Collett). The Committee has the task of producing a proposed set of boundaries and names for electorates for the ACT Legislative Assembly and determining the number of members of the Legislative Assembly to be elected from each electorate.

The Redistribution Process

The redistribution is carried out in accordance with the Electoral Act with several opportunities for public participation throughout the process.

Step 1 - Public Suggestions

Before the Redistribution Committee makes its proposal, any interested persons or organisations who wish to make suggestions regarding the redistribution are given 28 days to forward suggestions in writing to the Redistribution Committee. The Committee will formally invite public suggestions on 10 February 2011. Suggestions must be received by 10 March 2011.

Step 2 - Comments on the Public Suggestions

The public suggestions will be made available for public inspection from 11 March 2011 at the office of the ACT Electoral Commission and from the Commission's website. Any comments on the suggestions must be lodged in writing within 14 days. The closing date for comments is 24 March 2011.

Step 3 - The First Proposed Redistribution

The Redistribution Committee considers the public suggestions and comments before making the proposed redistribution. Maps showing the proposed boundaries and names of the electorates will be published in a newspaper and exhibited at the office of the ACT Electoral Commission and on the Commission's website.

Step 4 - Objections to the Proposed Redistribution

Following the publication of the first proposed redistribution there will be 28 days within which initial objections to the proposed redistribution may be lodged by members of the public or organisations.

Step 5 - Objections Considered by the Augmented Electoral Commission

The objections are considered by the augmented Electoral Commission. The augmented Electoral Commission comprises the Chairperson of the ACT Electoral Commission and the other part-time Member of the Commission, sitting together with the members of the Redistribution Committee. The augmented Electoral Commission may hold public hearings into objections.

Step 6 - The Second Proposed Redistribution

After it has considered all the initial objections lodged, the augmented Electoral Commission makes a second proposed redistribution. If this second proposal is not significantly different from the first proposal, the second set of proposed boundaries will become the final boundaries for the ACT.

Step 7 - Further Objections

If the second proposal is significantly different from the proposal made by the Redistribution Committee, the augmented Electoral Commission will invite further objections from members of the public or organisations. Further objections must be lodged within 28 days.

Step 8 - Final Determination

The augmented Electoral Commission will then consider any further objections. The augmented Electoral Commission may again hold public hearings into objections. Following its consideration of all objections, it will make a final determination of boundaries and names of electorates for the ACT.

Legal Requirements for a Redistribution

In making its proposed distribution, the Redistribution Committee is bound by section 36 of the Electoral Act and section 67D of the Commonwealth *Australian Capital Territory (Self-Government) Act 1988*.

The Electoral Act provides that the Territory must be divided into three separate electorates with seven members of the Legislative Assembly to be elected from one electorate and five members of the Legislative Assembly to be elected from each of the other two electorates.

The Self-Government Act sets out the following formula for calculating a quota:

$$\frac{\text{Number of Territory electors} \times \text{Number of electorate members}}{\text{Number of Territory members}}$$

In summary, the Electoral Act and the Self-Government Act provide that the Redistribution Committee and the augmented Electoral Commission shall -

- (a) ensure that the number of electors in an electorate immediately after the redistribution is within the range of not greater than 110%, or less than 90% of the quota;
- (b) endeavour to ensure, as far as practicable, that the number of electors in an electorate at the time of the next general election of members of the Legislative Assembly will not be greater than 105%, or less than 95%, of the expected quota for the electorate at that time; and
- (c) duly consider -
 - (i) the community of interests within each proposed electorate, including economic, social and regional interests;
 - (ii) the means of communication and travel within each proposed electorate;
 - (iii) the physical features and area of each proposed electorate;
 - (iv) the boundaries of existing electorates; and
 - (v) the boundaries of divisions and sections fixed under the *Districts Act 2002*.

Current and Projected Electoral Enrolment Statistics

The following statistics have been compiled for the 2011 redistribution of ACT electoral boundaries in preparation for the 2012 election for the ACT Legislative Assembly. The statistics are shown for ACT Statistical Local Areas (generally suburbs) in alphabetical order (in Table 1), and also according to the existing electoral boundaries for the ACT Assembly (in Tables 2 to 4).

The enrolment projections are derived from population projections and from electoral enrolments as at 30 September 2010.

The population projections were calculated using Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) projections relating to Statistical Local Areas (SLAs) defined according to the Australian Standard Geographic Classification (ASGC) – 2009 (ABS Cat. No. 1216.0). The SLA projections also incorporate information gained from forecasts of new occupied dwellings as provided by the ACT Government. This data takes into account the growth of Canberra's population due to expected developments between June 2010 to June 2013.

The enrolment information used by the ABS in calculating its projections was supplied by the Australian Electoral Commission and was current as at 30 September 2010.

The compilation of these projections was undertaken by the ABS as a consultancy project for the ACT Electoral Commission.

Enrolment statistics for January 2011 are shown in tables 5 to 8.

Methodology for the Projections

The general technique employed for the projections was the cohort-component method, widely accepted as the most accurate age/sex population projection method, if the required data is available. It involves applying fertility and mortality rates and migration rates/levels to the base population to produce a projected population, which in turn becomes the base for projecting the next year, and so on.

A three-tiered approach was taken to the process of calculating the projected enrolments.

- a. The ACT population was projected by age and sex from June 2010 to June 2013.
- b. The populations of all ACT SLAs were projected by age and sex and constrained to the total from part a.

- c. Actual enrolments as at 30 September 2010 were used to calibrate the SLA population projections, resulting in projected enrolments as at 20 October 2012.

1. Projections of the Total Population of the ACT

The base population for the ACT cohort-component projections was the revised ABS 30 June 2009 Estimated Resident Population, constrained to the 2009 ACT Projected Population using High Assumption. This base population incorporated results from the 2006 Census of Population and Housing and subsequent ABS population data.

The assumptions for fertility and mortality were from Population Projections 2010 to 2013 (ABS Cat. No. 3222.0) and the ACT High Series Projections. The mortality assumption was slightly adjusted to reflect more recent years' observed death levels. The migration assumptions, based on the ACT High Series Projections were:

2. Projections of the Populations of the SLAs (Suburbs)

The base population for the SLA cohort-component projections was the preliminary 30 June 2009 SLA age/sex Estimated Resident Population. The fertility, mortality and migration assumptions were based on an assessment of SLA-specific levels and trends observed over the past five to ten years. At each yearly step in this process, the SLA projections were constrained to sum to the ACT-level projection, helping to produce more reliable SLA results.

In addition to trend analysis, the SLA net migration assumptions incorporated forecasts of new occupied dwellings as provided by the ACT Government. To these forecasts persons-to-dwelling ratios derived from the 2006 Census were applied, giving new migration capacity for SLAs. This was then combined with estimates of underlying migration for existing SLA residents.

The age/sex distribution for the migration assumptions were based on overseas and inter-regional migration rates used in the calculation of published ABS SLA age/sex population estimates, which were originally derived from 2006 Population Census migration data.

The SLA projection results were collapsed into the age group 18 years or more and these were then interpolated to give results as at 30 September 2010 and 20 October 2012.

3. Projected Enrolments in SLAs

The SLA propensities of persons to be enrolled were calculated as the ratio of enrolments as at 30 September 2010 to the projected population aged 18 years or more at the same date. These propensities were then applied to the projected population aged 18 and over as at 20 October 2012 to give the projected enrolments by SLA. Minor adjustments were made for apparent enrolment lags in some SLAs.

Disclaimer

Any population projections are subject to some degree of uncertainty because it is impossible to exactly predict future trends, particularly the future level of migration. Projection of the population of small areas is especially hazardous. However, care has been taken to produce the best possible projections from the data currently available. It is important to recognise that the projection results given in this document essentially reflect the assumptions made about future fertility, mortality and migration trends.

While the assumptions are formulated on the basis of an objective assessment of demographic trends over the past decade and their likely future dynamics, there can be no certainty that they will be realised.

While ABS takes responsibility for the methodology employed, in accordance with ABS policy regarding small area population projections the assumptions used are the final responsibility of the client, and the projections are not official ABS population statistics.

The projections may be referred to as "...projections prepared by the ABS according to assumptions reflecting prevailing trends and anticipated new dwelling occupancies agreed to by the ACT Electoral Commission...".

No liability will be accepted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics for any damages arising from decisions or actions based upon this population projection consultancy service.
